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Professional advice will be shared at “joint” Breakout and Maintenance Rally in March

Airstream of Virginia's former senior technician, David “D.J.” Mastin, will be the guest speaker at the rally.

We may still be experiencing the chill of a cold winter, but take a close look under the fallen leaves around your home and you will probably see the first hints of new green growth. Spring will be here before you know it, and that means it's time for the members of Virginia's Airstream clubs to plan on attending the March 2018 Breakout and Maintenance Rally.

Like last year's rally, this will be a “joint” event. With NORVA hosting, members of the Virginia, Shenandoah Valley and Tidewater clubs will participate. The rally location will be the Fredericksburg KOA Campground; the dates are Friday, March 23, to Sunday, March 25.

The rally begins with a “Happy Hour” at 4:30 on the Friday afternoon, followed by a pot luck dinner at 6:30...bring a dish or dessert to share. After dinner there will be an informal group discussion to prepare questions and develop a list of topics for Saturday's guest speaker. Rally host Tom Carmichael has arranged for David “D.J.” Mastin, the former senior technician at Airstream of Virginia, to participate. Starting at 9 on

Saturday morning, D.J. will be at the campground to share his wealth of professional knowledge and experience about repairing and maintaining Airstream trailers, vans, and motor homes. He will stay most of the day to answer questions, discuss specific mechanical or electrical RV problems, and help members understand the ins and outs of their RVs.

Later on that Saturday, Airstream will sponsor the evening meal and talk about what is new and ongoing at the company, its dealerships, and for Airstream owners in 2018.

If last year is any indication, this will be a well-attended rally. To attend, fill out and mail the coupon on Page 10 of this newsletter. The rally fee is \$20 per person, payable to Tom Carmichael. As a Garden Club member, she established a nature camp at her farm, in partnership with the Piedmont Environmental Council, helping young people understand the importance of conservation. For many years Farrar also owned clothing stores in the Warrenton area. Many in NORVA have fond memories of October 2007, when Gina and her husband hosted a memorable weekend Airstream rally in a field next to their farmhouse. People who knew Farrar will always remember her vitality and zest for life.

Dinner theater rally hits its mark!



Planning underway for NORVA's spring caravan

Inclusive dates: May 22 to June 10, 2018

Jackson McBroom, 2nd vice president, is the club officer responsible for NORVA's annual caravan. With his wife, Mary Ann, he is planning a great one for 2018.

This spring, Jackson hopes to answer a controversial question: "Were Union Generals Ulysses S. Grant and William Tecumseh Sherman merciless, cold-hearted, 'butchers' of the Civil War, or were they talented military tacticians commissioned by a desperate Abraham Lincoln to prosecute a swift and merciful end to a brutal war?"


This caravan is entitled, "Grant, Sherman, and the Critical Battles of the Western Civil War." Airstreamers will visit several prominent battle sites where one or both generals were engaged. Explains Jackson: "We will attempt to improve our understanding of these two men and decide for ourselves what motivated their actions. We hope to discover the

truth about the pivotal roles each played in the war. We'll analyze their decisions—good and bad—timing, luck, the resources that dictated their moves, and the outcomes."

The caravan itinerary includes stops at Shiloh, Fort Donelson, and Chattanooga in Tennessee; Vicksburg in Mississippi; and Chickamauga, Atlanta and Savannah in Georgia. But Civil War battlefields will not be the sole focus of the trip. The caravanners will also visit antebellum homes; the state capitol in Jackson, Miss.; the Birmingham, Ala., Civil Rights Institute; the 'World of Coca-Cola' in Atlanta; and other significant places along the route.

The McBrooms say that this caravan will last just under three weeks.

It will launch on Tuesday, May 22, 2018, from Dover, Tenn., and end on Sunday, June 10, in Savannah. This is a bit longer than other NORVA unit caravans, but Jackson insists the time will be well-spent.

An odyssey in the land of ancient caravans

Two NORVA couples explore Jerusalem as the U.S. recognizes the city as Israel's capital
(Part II)

Editor's note: From Nov. 29 to Dec. 8, 2017, NORVA members Cynthia and Paul Pearce and Lew and Cathy Brodsky toured Israel together. In Part I of this article, (see the January 2018 issue of NORVA News), Cynthia described the first half of the tour, which included travel to Caesarea, the Golan Heights, and throughout the Galilee Region. The balance of the tour was spent in Jerusalem and at sites near the Dead Sea.

Finally, it was time to spend a few days in Jerusalem, Israel's largest city. We spent five nights and enjoyed many meals at the world-famous King David Hotel, overlooking the ancient walls of Old Jerusalem. It gave us a splendid taste of lavish living. Sumptuous breakfasts and our final banquet were enjoyed in the hotel's elaborate dining room. Service was perfect and the food was delicious. Eating out in this city was also fun and adventurous. The food was unusual and fantastic. Israel's food is a combination of cuisines from the Middle East and the various parts of the world where immigrants lived before coming to the Jewish state. Our group enjoyed a five-course meal at one restaurant, prepared in front of us by Israeli chef Michael Katz. Burp! We all rolled out of that one. By this time Lew had decided to ride herd on our small group of

tourists (there were seven other American couples on the tour). Lew hung back on our walks to ensure that nobody got lost in the crowds or lagged behind. Our tour leader was thankful for Lew's assistance and didn't realize Lew was simply making good use of his ample experience as the designated "caboose" on many Airstream caravans.

In Jerusalem, we visited the Israel Museum and toured virtually all the ancient Jewish and Christian holy sites, including the birthplace of Jesus in nearby Bethlehem. We spent solemn moments at the Western ("Wailing") Wall of Solomon's Temple, Judaism's most holy site, where we left prayers on little scraps of paper in the crevices between the stones. And, thanks to an ongoing archeological dig,

we were able to take a long, deep, narrow walk *under* the wall. We trekked down to bedrock to see the huge sandstone blocks

put in place during the time of King Herod, more than 2,000 years ago. Then we had to turn around and retrace our route, because the usual exit into the Arab Quarter of Old Jerusalem was blocked. It was not a place for those who are claustrophobic. The old walled city occupies only one-square kilometer of land and is divided into Arab, Christian, Jewish, and Armenian Quarters. The narrow alleys and holy sites were so mesmerizing it was hard to leave. We walked through the Arab Souk, or market, which

was closed in protest because of President Trump's announcement two days earlier about moving the American Embassy and recognizing Jerusalem as Israel's capital. It was strangely quiet until the Muslim call to prayers blasted from loudspeakers. By contrast the bustling food market with stalls operated by Jews and Christians, and spread out among several nearby streets in Jerusalem, was colorful, lively, and wonderfully loud with the shouts of merchants and shoppers. We tasted many samples of

delicious donuts, pastries, fruits, and halvah, a confection made from ground sesame seeds and honey.

When I asked the others in our group to describe their most memorable experiences on the tour, most mentioned the emotion-filled visit to the Yad Vashem World Holocaust Remembrance Center in Jerusalem, and the walk through the tunnel under the Wall.

Everyone also lauded our personable and knowledgeable tour leader. Danny Cohen was born and raised in Israel. Native-born



Israelis call themselves “sabras,” after the native desert fruit—tough and prickly on the outside, soft and sweet inside. The 54-year-old Cohen is a former Israeli Army tank commander. He has four daughters serving in the Israel Defense Forces (IDF). It was obvious that he loves his country and enjoys sharing its wonders with visitors. His informative narrative included a wealth of first-person anecdotes on every aspect of Israel. For example, he helped excavate Roman-era cities as a college archeology student, witnessed the horrors of the 1967 war as a four-year-old child, lost relatives in the Holocaust of World War II, and had a grandfather who was one of the first people to view and evaluate the Dead Sea Scrolls. Written around the Second or First Century B.C. by the Essenes, a Jewish religious sect living in the eastern desert of Roman-occupied Judea, the scrolls are the oldest parchments ever found containing the Old Testament bible. (Cohen’s grandfather did not think they were genuine, but he was wrong!)

On the last day of our tour, we drove to Qumran National Park, an area of caves along the Dead Sea in the West Bank where the scrolls were found



in 1947. What a remarkable find! Then we went further down the road to Masada, a mountain fortress looming high above the Dead Sea and surrounded by desert in majestic and strange isolation. We took a cable car to the top (thank goodness) for an extensive exploration of two elaborate palaces King Herod had built for his family, but never visited after they were finished. This place is sacred to Jews and remembered in history, not for King Herod, but for serving as the last stronghold of the futile Jewish revolt against the Romans in 73 A.D. The view from the top was spectacular; however, the fact that the more than 960 Jewish men woman and children committed suicide here,



rather than be taken as slaves by the attacking Roman Legion, was sobering and mitigated the beauty of the place.

On this last day of touring, our final treat was to don bathing suits and float in (or more accurately, on) the Dead Sea. It was a uniquely strange experience. You cannot sink because of the water's extremely high mineral content. This is the lowest point on earth (1,411 feet below sea level).

A final note is one that ties in with Airstreams: Lew and Cathy's flight home from Tel Aviv was before dawn on the final day of the tour, but our flight was not until 11:30 at night. That gave us an extra day in Jerusalem. Through folks we had met on the recent Airstream "American Revolution Caravan – the Southern Campaign," we contacted **Ed and Abbe Krissman**. They are Israelis who own an Airstream trailer which they keep in Milwaukee. Their Jerusalem home is not far from the King David Hotel. The Krissmans treated us to a very delicious Sabbath dinner, a neighborhood walk, some soup, and homemade cookies. They told us lots of Airstream stories and arranged our transportation from Jerusalem back to the airport in Tel Aviv. The couple travels frequently to the U.S.A. As W.B.C.C.I. members-at-large, they are signed up to be on Ed and Beth Jones' American Revolution caravans in 2018 and 2019. It is indeed a small world.
