



where Maryland, Virginia, and West Virginia come together. In the afternoon, the Shepards took everyone to meet their friends Randy & Katherine (Clissy) Funkhouser who own O'Sullivan Farms. This is West Virginia's oldest Thoroughbred farm, breeding racehorses since 1939. To the delight of the Airstreamers, the month of May is the heart of foaling season and they were able to get up close and personal with dozens of beautiful mares and their foals. Randy's grandfather, who started the farm, also bought several of the historic homes in the Charles Town area that were built by members of the Washington family (yes, THAT Washington—President George). Leading the rally group on a driving tour of the Washington family homes, Randy stopped at Harewood, completed in 1770 by George's brother, Samuel. Amazingly, Harewood remains a Washington family property, occupied today by Walter Washington, a direct descendent of Samuel. Walter graciously allowed everyone inside to see the parlor and dining areas. These rooms still have original woodwork and paint, and a stunning fireplace of Italian marble given to George by Lafayette. In the parlor, James Madison married Dolly Payne Todd in 1794.

And the day was not over yet! The group visited Charles Town Races Friday night to dine in the "Skyline Terrace" restaurant while viewing and betting on horses in eight races. Tom Carmichael picked a horse to win in the fifth race and it won! Others were not so lucky but had fun nonetheless.



Lunch on Saturday overlooked the Potomac River in the "fine dining" section of the famous Bavarian Inn, a German/Continental restaurant and resort in Shepherdstown.

Next it was time to burn off the dumplings and fancy desserts with a walking tour of Shepherdstown, guided by Jay Hurley. It included a stop at a monument dedicated to James Rumsey, a mechanical

engineer credited with inventing the first steam-powered boat in 1787, followed by a private viewing of a replica of the "Rumsey Experiment," a working half-scale of the steamboat, lovingly reconstructed by Mr. Hurley and others. While Shepherdstown's residents take pride in Mr. Rumsey's 18th Century accomplishment, they are chagrined that a commercially successful steamboat in New York, developed by Robert Fulton, is often credited as being "first."

Actually, Fulton's boat came later, in 1807.

A steak dinner back at the Shepard home completed a great Saturday. Jay Hurley was at the dinner and provided musical entertainment playing his hammered dulcimer.

Coming up real soon: fun time in Doswell

NORVA President Dick Arnold says get ready for the 62nd International Airstream Rally!

For the first time in the Club's long history, the International Rally is being held in Virginia. Did you register for the 62nd International Rally in Doswell? If so, you should have received an e-mail notice telling you the date you and your Airstream can arrive at the Meadow Event Park. If you have not yet signed up to attend, it's not too late; however, campsites with electric and water may no longer be available. But this rally is in NORVA's "backyard," and it will probably never again be so close to home. So, if you are not able to camp in Doswell, you may wish to consider leaving your rig at home and commuting to the rally. If that's your plan, check in at the Staging Area when you arrive. They will welcome you and provide additional information. And you will pay a reduced registration fee because you are not camping.

If you have reserved a campsite, be sure to bring extra water hose, adapters and a power extension cable. It pays to be well prepared in case the distances from your rig to power or water is longer than usual. Prepare to be flexible!

If you intend to park with friends or other NORVA members, you need to arrive at the rally together to park together. You might arrange to rendezvous at the Flying J at Exit 104

off I-95, and then proceed to Doswell in caravan.

When arriving at The Meadow Event Park, follow signs to the Bull Pen. You will be given a goody bag which includes your rally ribbons, program, and other information. Then the parking crew will guide you to your parking space.

After parking, go to the Farm Bureau Center (the main pavilion) and confirm your registration. Times and location will be in the program. You will be able to sign up for different events—tours, Region 3 Luncheon on July 23, flea market, etc. If you are interested in future caravans, you will be able to learn about them from caravan leaders at tables set up for that purpose.


Need help finding your friends? There will be a "Locator Board" to help, along with a bulletin board where members can post information.

Not ready yet—


Opening of new home for Airstream of Virginia is delayed

Ashland, Va.—She had hoped to open the new showroom and service bays at Airstream of Virginia in May, but the slow building permit process, landscaping issues, and other unforeseen problems have caused delays. “The contractor is now obligated to complete work in June,” says Tammi Hopkins, general manager of Camping World, and Airstream of Virginia.

Until the new facility opens its doors, sales and service for Airstreams are being accomplished next door at McGeorge’s Rolling Hills RV.

Hopkins says the new building will have 13 service bays but she is facing a shortage of qualified technicians. She needs to hire more.

She plans to hold an open house on July 20, inviting Airstreamers and the public to enjoy food and drink in coordination with the nearby WBAC International Rally. Hopkins says Airstream of Virginia will be displaying and selling new trailers and Class B vans at the rally.

Confused by the name game?

What are we calling ourselves these days? This question has been asked repeatedly over the years. That’s because most club members have never been entirely comfortable with a legal club name that does not include the word, “Airstream.” Organized officially in 1955, the legal, registered name of the club is the “Wally Byam Caravan Club International, Inc.,” or W.B.C.C.I. But there’s no “Airstream” in that.

So, more recently, the club obtained permission to include “Airstream” in several variations of the name. This produced a plethora of “aliases” and “doing business as (DBA)” names. (See the list in the box.) And it allowed components of the club to add “Airstream” to their names. That’s why we now call ourselves the “NORVA Airstream Club.”

But, when someone asks, “What do you call the International club?,” what’s the answer? “Wally Byam Airstream Club (WBAC)” seems to be the preferred name

in today’s conversations. Indeed, International President Barry Bell has asked that the logo showing this DBA name be used as often as possible, instead of the older WBCCI logo. With that in mind, future issues of *NORVA News* will refer to the big club as “WBAC.” Now you know!

American Revolution caravan makes final stops in Virginia

The latest “national” WBAC caravan examining the patriots, Tories, soldiers, places, and events surrounding America’s 18th Century battle for independence from England ended recently in Virginia. Led by NORVA’s Ed & Beth Jones over the past four years, this final one, “The American Revolution - Southern Campaign,” started in New Bern, N.C., and concluded 40 days later on May 19th with a farewell banquet in Williamsburg, Va. The Joneses had committed to doing four national WBAC caravans about the Revolutionary War Period, spreading them over four years. The first and third, in 2016 and 2018, covered the war and events leading up to it in the Northern Colonies. The Southern Campaign caravan also ran twice, in 2017 and again this year. Ed says these caravans will probably continue to have alternating-year runs in the future, but with different caravan leaders.

For this 2019 caravan there were 28 participants in 14 Airstreams. The Joneses varied the itinerary slightly from their 2017 caravan, adding visits to some of the places made famous by Virginia’s patriot, Patrick Henry. The caravanners saw “Scotchtown,” Henry’s home near Ashland, Va., where he lived from 1771 to 1778; and they ate at nearby historic Hanover Tavern, which was once owned by Henry’s father-in-law.

The photos on this page show the group’s visit to St. John’s Church in Richmond on May 14. This was the church where Patrick Henry delivered his famous “Give me liberty or give me death” speech during a debate at the Second Virginia Convention, March 23, 1775.

Costumed actors re-enacted the event for the caravanners, and posed with them outside the church (photo at top of page).

Stumbling upon a vintage Dinosaurostream

As the daughter of two WBAC members, I can't help but yelp with glee whenever I stumble upon an iconic silver bullet in an unexpected place. So imagine my delight when, smack dab in the heart of Walt Disney World, I came face to façade with an Airstream International sporting familiar red numerals.

It was the third day of my first-ever trip to the “most magical place on earth,” and I was making my way through Disney’s Animal Kingdom. Between the 96-degree heat and the seven-foot tall meerkat boogying through a seemingly perpetual Hakuna Matata dance party, I thought for a moment I might be hallucinating. But no, in an animal park where half the animals are animatronic and the lines between reality and fantasy are delightfully—and sometimes disturbingly—blurred, this Airstream was completely authentic.

I snapped a photo, sent it to my parents, and hurried off to get in line for yet another puke-and-wonder-inducing ride. But when I got home, I couldn't resist doing a little more research into this hidden gem. It turns out that, like everything else in the impeccably designed Animal Kingdom, the Airstream has a fabricated backstory. It sits in “Dinoland U.S.A.,” a portion of the park situated in the fictional “Diggs County,” where a local man purportedly discovered dinosaur fossils in 1947. A “Dino Institute” sprang up on the site, and grad student paleontologists eventually turned a local fishing lodge into their cafeteria, naming it the Restaurantosaurus. The lodge—really just a quick-serve restaurant for sweaty kids in Mickey Mouse ears—suppos-



edly expanded over time to include a number of dino-themed additions. The Airstream (ostensibly owned by an early paleontologist but, so the Internet claims, actually the property of a Disney Imagineer’s grandmother) was incorporated into “The Hip Joint” recreation room.

In keeping with the park’s fictional history, the trailer itself has been altered by “grad student pranks.” Thus, the letters of “Airstream” have been rearranged to read “I ARE SMART,” and the model name now reads “International-osaurus.” Inside the restaurant, the Airstream’s wall has been removed so patrons can walk straight from the building into the trailer, where a jukebox and two booths make it the most popular seating area in Dinoland. The jukebox, of course, features paelo-pun selections such as Simon & Garfunkel’s “I Am a Rock” and Jerry Lee Lewis’s “Great Balls of Fire.” As for the food...if you’re in the mood for chili cheese dogs, jalapeño poppers, and chicken

nuggets, this is the place for you. If all of that sounds as revolting to you as it does to me, however, at least you can feast your eyes on the Airstream!




Airstream URLs will change this month

When you read *NORVA News* on your computer, you probably know that you can click on any of the “hyperlinks” appearing on its pages. Doing so takes you to a screen showing whatever the subject of the link is all about. The link may be an e-mail address, which will bring up your e-mail program and automatically address your message to the linked mailbox or, more often, it’s a hyperlink to a “URL (Uniform Resource Locator).” That’s a fancy name identifying the Internet location of website,

URLs contain domain names, which group sites by common subject matter. For example, you have been viewing Airstream club-related sites with the domain names “wbcci.org” or “wbcci.net.”

The purpose of this article is to let you know that Airstream club-related domain names are changing. Instead of wbcci.net or wbcci.org, unit websites associated with the Wally Byam club will be migrating to a new domain name “airstreamclub.net.”

How does this affect NORVA? Currently, you reach NORVA’s website by typing or linking to <https://northva.wbcci.net>. But, effective on or about June 15, 2019, NORVA’s website will have a new URL and the old one will no longer work: <https://NorthernVirginia.airstreamclub.net>.

The site itself will look the same. You will still be able to view current and back issues of *NORVA News* there, as well as lots of other NORVA information.
